GREETINGS! Hopefully by the time you receive this *Winter Issue of the Friend's Newsletter*, most of the staff changes generated by the 2012-13 City of Long Beach General Fund Budget cuts adopted by the City Council in September, have been implemented.

No full time staff were laid off by the budget cuts because of staff retirements and interdepartmental transfers provided open positions. THIS DOES NOT MEAN THAT WE DON'T HAVE FEWER STAFF. We do have less staff. The previous staffing pattern at six of our Neighborhood Libraries has been radically changed. At these six libraries, we now have only one librarian; 1.6 clerk positions, and less hours for page positions.



Hopefully by now, the new positions of *Administrative Intern* (for 20 hours a week) have been filled, and the new people trained, assigned, and working. When staffing is cut by roughly 50%, things can't be the same and we, as patrons, have no right to expect the same level of service. Please stay patient and appreciative and remember to thank the staff for what they are doing.



So, to the question of the use of **VOLUNTEERS** to keep a library open on Sunday to replace staff was broached, the following response to City Council was made: Long Beach Public Library values and currently uses Volunteers...over 100 volunteers work thousands of hours each year. There are things volunteers can and are welcome to do and are

already doing.

Volunteers, under the supervision of Staff, CAN assist with programs: set up rooms, get out materials for special programs, clean up after activities, unload supplies, decorate, put away materials,



and read to children. The LBPL already has two programs using volunteers with children: *Book Worm* and *Practice Makes Perfect*.

What Volunteers **CAN NOT** do is replace a <u>Master's Degree level Librarian</u> who is a reference specialist, or other trained staff. Because of City Policy, a volunteer can not check materials in or out because of access to confidential patron information. Volunteers can not ensure safety as this requires specialized City training not currently available to volunteers or even seasonal staff. Furthermore, they can not be given city staff phone numbers, or city e-mail accounts.

HOW DO YOU BECOME A VOL-UNTEER? Probably the best place to start is to meet with your local neighborhood librarian to find out the needs of that library, if you're willing to do the work needed and if you can

make the regular time commitment. A second step must be completed before any volunteer work begins, is to fill out requisite paper work and get finger printed by the LBPD (a complaint that has been heard is that this step takes an inordinate amount of time.). Fingerprint records from other state, federal, or private agencies are not acceptable. It is not legal for one organization to share fingerprint results with another organization.

If you go to the LBPL website <www.lbpl.org>, under the drop down menu "Support the Library", you can click on Volunteer Program to see what volunteer positions are currently available. The Library always needs help in the Information Center for People with Disabilities (ICPD) and Friend's Bookstore. If there is a position you're interested in, you will be able to print out the online application Finished applications can be turned into any library for processing.

Road Trip To Cambodia



This past October, library staff completed a trip to **Phnom Penh**, **Cambodia**, that included four days of intense shopping for books in **Khmer and Khmer/ English** on various topics: math, cooking, business, biographies, customs and culture, wedding ceremonies, history, religion, martial arts, children's books, self-help, popular novels and learning the Khmer language.

All the major book stores, as well as the *Documentation Center of Cambodia, Buddhist Institute,* and of course the *National Cambodian Library* were searched. In the end, 1,402 brand new books and magazines were shipped back to Long Beach, CA, in 22 boxes that weighed 411.5 kg (907.2 lbs).

Unfortunately, **Khmer** and **Khmer/English** books haven't been bought since January 2008 because they are not available locally and ordering from Cambodia is not possible (*Long Beach has the largest population of Cambodian Americans in the United States*).



This highly successful venture would not have been accomplished without the collaboration of the YMCA of Greater Long Beach and the Cambodian YMCA staff who

provided translation services and transportation; the Miller Foundation, The Friends of the Long Beach Library, and the Long Beach Rotary Charitable Foundation through the Long Beach Public Library Foundation provided funding for the books and the trip.

The Year in Review

It's hard to believe the year has passed so quickly! We experienced many library successes, and some challenges. However, the year ended with on-going funding to offset budget reductions and continue critical library services to our community.

A few 2012 highlights...

We were awarded a \$15,000 Cal Humanities Grant for California Reads "Searching for Democracy" for a variety of community programs, including author talks by Rebecca Solnit, Christopher Phillips, Jeanne Wakatsuki Houston and Dr. Stephanie McCurry.

LBPL went **"green"** for overdue and hold notifications

- Established the Pam Ratner Collection at Bret Harte with more than \$10,000 in donations through the Friends of LBPL
- Launched our online chat and *Text-a-librarian* service
- **City Council** approved \$400,000 (*on-going*) to provide support staff at 6 libraries to implement a new library model and offset reductions, and \$400,000 (*one-time*) via the **Uplands Oil Fund** to implement **RFID** and self-check services at all Long Beach Libraries
- The Friends of LBPL provided \$60,000+ for media and book purchases and \$21,000 for Summer Reading Club programs, staff training and supplies!

We are truly grateful for the continued support and advocacy of our dear "Friends" that help us meet the expectation of free access to library resources and programs for our community. We appreciate you!!


